In Memory of Nelma Fetterman

The Club lost a valued and loyal member when Nelma Fetterman passed away suddenly at St. Boniface Hospital on March 9. Nelma grew up as the youngest of six children in Starbuck, Manitoba. After high school, she attended Normal School, which was the teacher preparation program of the time. She recently attended the 66th anniversary of her class. Nelma taught in a one-room school, a three-room school, and a large junior high school before attaining her Bachelor of Education degree at the University of Alberta, a Master's degree in Clothing and Textiles at Michigan State University, and her PhD at the Ohio State University, where she specialized in clothing and textiles and computer and information science. She was a professor and researcher at the Universities of Alberta and Manitoba.

After retirement in 2003, she joined the Club and was very involved, chairing the Membership Committee, serving several terms as Treasurer, as a Board Member, and as Treasurer of the Friends of Ralph Connor House. She was a regular bridge player in the social, duplicate, and marathon groups. Nelma was active with PEO, her church, and home economics organizations, and she supported the symphony, theatre, and opera in Winnipeg with her attendance and donations. She was a very capable, independent person who enjoyed her life, and she was very involved with her friends, nieces and nephews, godchildren, and community. She will be missed.

A service of remembrance will be held Saturday afternoon, April 22, at Thomson "In the Park."

It was very special to be able to attend the first week of meetings of the 67th Meeting of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) at the United Nations, in New York, from March 6 to the 11th. Although not part of the CFUW delegation, I was graciously included with CFUW activities. Sandy Millen and I were room mates, and as our earlier email explained, we had a very busy week! The above photos are from the UN, with CFUW President, Joy Hurst. There will be an opportunity for all UWCW members to learn a bit more about our experiences at the UN, probably late April or May, and I hope you can attend. CFUW put on a very impressive and well attended Parallel Event on the topic "Evening the Odds in Digital Education for Marginalized Women and Girls".

The CFUW Resolutions were distributed March 1, and include the following titles. The amendments must be received by April 24. The Issues and Actions committee will take on the task of reviewing the CFUW Resolutions and make recommendations for support and/or amendment.

- Immigration Detention in Canada
- A comprehensive maternal death prevention strategy
- Fair Treatment for Canadians Suffering from Chronic Lyme Disease and other Tick-borne Diseases
- The Impact of International Trade Agreements

Finally, CFUW has circulated a Request for Proposals: International Service Project. Each year, CFUW clubs raise funds for an international project or program to empower women and girls in the global South. CFUW is currently seeking proposals from the international development community for the next cycle of fundraising. Read the full Request for Proposals **here**. Monday Afternoon Book club


We meet the first Monday of the month from October until June (excluding January).

Club members are welcome to attend any of our presentations.






Contemporary Literature Book club
