


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Co-Presidents' Message

The University Women's Club of Winnipeg receives Centennial Organization Award from the Manitoba Historical Society.

On Monday, February 13th, the University Women's Club of Winnipeg (UWC) was honoured to welcome Dan Furlan, President of the Manitoba Historical Society (MHS) for the presentation of the Centennial Organization Award after a more than two-year delay due to Covid. This award is granted to non-profit and not-for-profit groups that have operated continuously in Manitoba for 100 years or more and who have contributed to their communities in the areas of culture, economic development, education, health, heritage, labour, politics, recreation and sport, religion, and social reform. UWC can tick off a number of those boxes!

The University Women's Club of Winnipeg was founded in 1909 as a vehicle for the new outgoing professional woman. Its early membership included such activists as Lillian Benyon Thomas and Dr. Mary Crawford. Besides the lighter aspects of social and literary functions, UWC sponsored meetings with such figures as J.S. Woodsworth, Nellie McClung, and the famous British suffragette Emmeline Pankhurst. This was an organization of a different nature to most other womens' groups at the time. In the struggle for the vote and prohibition, middle-class women banded together for strength and discovered the rewards of joint action. That legacy continues to this day, with a major part of UWC's membership activities focused on advocacy, continued education, and scholarship.



In Memory of Velma Motheral

Though you may have read the <u>obituary</u> of our late member I would like to add more to the account by adding some references to her many years as a member of the University Women's club.

When Velma applied for membership in 1961 (Annual Fees - \$9.00) the club had a thriving membership of over two hundred ranging from those who were already long time members to fairly recent graduates. They had all lived through WW2 and were in various stages of life experience – many employed in various professions, some as young brides and/or mothers and others nearing the empty nest situation but all affected by the recent loss of loved ones.

The club was a hive of activities with residents and staff living on the upper floors of the building. Velma had many memories to share from that era and did so with her unique blend of good nature and homespun humour. The pictures she shared were of very different period which held little resemblance to our present situation.

She recalled the "Young Grads" group who planned and shared gourmet dinners, "Green Thumbs" who cared for the grounds and gardens, "Handicrafts " whose efforts were sold as fund raising and others who toiled to paint and redecorate when space became available on the second floor. She told of the 80's convention when the club brought Margaret Mead as a visiting speaker to Winnipeg and of the 90's presentation of "The Metis Suite".

After the Handicrafts group aged and changed into the Sunroom Group, Velma and her late sister Elva cherished the time they spent with this special cluster of friends. Sadly its numbers shrank over time and every effort has been made to keep it active. Velma's part in keeping the past fresh has been a highlight of Thursday afternoons. We will miss her greatly.

Strength, conviction, grit, compassion and forgiveness are words used to describe Wilma Derksen.

In November 1984 Wilma and Cliff Derksen's 13-year-old daughter, Candace, went missing on her way home from school in Winnipeg, Canada. It wasn't until 22 years later that Mark Grant was charged with her murder and received a 25 year life sentence. However in 2017, Grant was found 'not guilty' in a second trial and released.

Welcome March and International Women's Day!

The CIA committee has continued to follow up on its identified priorities.

Our letter to Rochelle Squires, Minister of Families, Minister Responsible for the Status of Women, has been the first step in supporting CFUW's resolution advocating for changes to bail conditions in situations of intimate partner violence. **One of CFUW's guiding principles has always been the protection of women and this resolution to tighten bail laws would provide further protection for victims of intimate partner violence.**

Is this a pervasive problem? Quoting Minister Squires: "Manitoba has some of the highest rates of intimate partner violence and family violence in Canada". A study by the federal Department of Justice revealed that 50% of partners charged with intimate partner assault violate their bail conditions.

Our commitment to supporting the CFUW resolution regarding single-use plastics and packaging has made us more conscious of other environmental issues.

February 18 was National Battery Day.

Did you know that used batteries make up less that 1% of all waste found in municipal landfills. But that 1% is responsible for 88% of all the toxic heavy metal found in the landfill. The elements in a battery can be completely recycled. Learn more at:

Many thanks to our hardworking volunteers who restored these beautiful pieces to their lustrous glory.




Monday Afternoon Book club

On **April 3**: <u>Hamnet and Judith</u> by Maggie O'Farrell.




