# **Continuing Education**

The Continuing Education Committee is hard at work on two fall courses. **Stay tuned for details in September!** The next meeting scheduled for the Committee is June 19, 11:30 to 1:00.

#### POWER OF PRINT 2024: Under the Radar - Explored

We had such positive feedback about this year's **Power of Print: Under the Radar**, which ran from April 9 through May 14, that it seemed a good idea to give the Club a recap of the course with some suggestions for further exploration and/or reading!

As always, **Charlene Diehl** provided a thought-provoking opening lecture with Hiding in Plain Sight: Exploring New Territory in Contemporary Writing. And she covered a lot of territory, especially with her comprehensive reading list. A few titles that stood out for our committee members were: Janika Oza's A History of Burning (a family sharing about Indian immigration to Africa, UK, and Canada); Will Aitken's The Swells (satiric novel about wealth and cruise ships); and Meira Cook's The Full Catastrophe (set in Winnipeg). Charlene left some paper copies of her list; ask us if you would like one.

**Pam Perkins** introduced us to women's travel writing in the early 19th century, specifically from sisters Jane Waldie and Charlotte Eaton, intrepid Scottish travellers. A little hard to find in libraries today, but if you like e-books you can find an 1888 reprint of Charlotte Eaton's Waterloo Days: The Narrative of an Englishwoman Resident at Brussels in June, 1815 by searching <u>Project Gutenberg</u>. That site also has her Continental adventures: a novel in three parts published in 1826. Google Books gives you online / downloadable access to Jane Waldie's Sketches Descriptive of Italy in the years 1816 and 1817. You could also check <u>Winnipeg Public Library's catalogue</u> searching "women travellers" to find historical and contemporary experiences of adventurous women.

We welcomed back **Michael Bumsted** who gave us insider insights into the publishing industry and the impact of reviews — both real and fake! — on rankings and sales. Among his many suggestions, Michael highlighted the British Library's Classic Crimes series — "a gripping collection of British detective stories from the Golden Age of crime" which the British Library has reprinted. Other options mentioned in his presentation included series by Ian Hamilton (Ava Lee), Charles Todd (Inspector Ian Rutledge; Nurse Bess Crawford), and Ann Cleeves (Vera), to name just a few. A little more off the radar was The Bangalore Detective Club by Harini Nagendra. Whodunit's most recent newsletter listed their three current best-sellers: These were Lemon Curd by Laura Child, Everyone On This Train is Suspect, by Benjamin Stevenson, and A Pie to Die For by Gretchen Rue. Of course you can find these and many other great choices in Michael's bookstore!

And then, for something completely different, **David Annandale** brought us 'The Joy of Fear: An Introduction to Horror Fiction'. This may have been the most challenging session for some, but discussion quickly revealed we had knowledgeable readers in the audience. Beginning with classic titles like The Mysteries of Udolpho, Frankenstein and Dracula, David brought us through the twentieth century with Shirley Jackson, Ray Bradbury, Daphne du Maurier, Stephen King and more. Vampires and zombies made their appearance more often as David explored the growing popularity of horror movies. Did you know we have a horror bookshop in Winnipeg? <u>Raven's End Books</u> at 1859 Portage Avenue allows you to browse and find your next scary read. You can also discover more of this genre in our public library system searching subjects like "horror" and "ghost stories". But don't read them too late at night!

**Luke Tromly** led us into the world of echo-tourism in which people seek to recreate for themselves journeys made by famous people. Many of us seek out the birthplace or usual haunts of our favourite authors when we travel, but faithfully re-enacting an historical journey takes that to a new level. The efforts made by Roger Mear and Robert Swan (<u>In the Footsteps of Scott</u>) to replicate Scott's ill-fated Antarctic expedition showed just how far some people will go. Our discussion also highlighted how today's societal values and norms may influence how we view the views of earlier travellers. Whose footprints might you choose to echo?

**Vanessa Warne** took us back again to Victorian England, this time to explore the writing of poet Michael Field. This was a new name for many of us, and it was even more of a revelation to learn that it was the pseudonym of two women, Katherine Harris Bradley and her niece and ward Edith Emma Cooper, who collaborated on about 40 works. Their writing is not easily found in public libraries, but searching "Michael Field poetry" on Google will find many selections of their work. And if you are a craft enthusiast, <u>check out this article</u> in The Manitoban about Vanessa's students' work with pinhole cameras.
